Revenue Options for School Finance-State Senate

The State Senate is looking at a variety of options; the precise mix of revenue sources and details of each are being worked out. There is nothing in writing, no plan has been laid out and no bill has been filed, so these options are subject to change. Also the Governor has a plan and the House will have a plan. Constitutionally, tax bills must originate in the House. However, when a House bill reaches the Senate, the Senate typically substitutes its ideas on the legislation.

The Senate apparently is looking at a new Business Franchise Tax that would take the place of the current franchise tax. There are several variations being discussed, but they are all similar to the "Option 1" laid out below. This variation of the Business Franchise Tax is laid out below along with its other tax components. At this point in time, it would be helpful to get more detailed information on the impact of the New Business Franchise Tax.

Accompanying this is a worksheet based upon "Option 1" that we would like you to fill out and return either via email or fax to 512/473-3773. We will keep any information you provide confidential. You may just want to fill out the total amount of your gross business activity, leaving the first two lines blank on the form, and complete the balance of each form. Also you can identify yourself only as to the type of trade or business. We do not use company names. We only use the data and combine it with the data from the other companies.

Below are outlines of the options believed to be considered at this time.

Option 1:

- Increase sales tax rate by 1% (from 6.25% to 7.25%)
- Increase motor vehicle sales tax by 2% (from 6.25% to 8.25%)
- Eliminate local M&O school property taxes and adopt a statewide property tax with a constitutional cap of \$0.75 (a statewide average reduction of 50% in school property taxes).
- Repeal the current franchise tax.
- Adopt a new business franchise tax with the following elements:

Ø Taxable base: federal taxable income, plus employee compensation, apportioned to Texas based on gross receipts, less the higher of a \$500,000 standard deduction or a \$10,000 per employee deduction. Assume combined nexus reporting. Multiply the taxable base by a rate of 1.9%.

Texas Supreme Court Validates Subcontractor Pass-through Agreements

Portions of Subcontractor Amicus Brief Influenced Supreme Court in decision.

On April 16th, 2004, the Texas Supreme Court approved the use of "Pass-Through Claim" contracts

in Texas. These are agreements allowing the wronged party (the subcontractor) to recover damages caused by the party committing the wrong (the owner of a construction project). For the reason the Subcontractor does no contract directly with the Owner, these agreements allow the General Contractor to pursue the claim on behalf of the Subcontractor. The Subcontractor pays for the costs of the pursuit of the claim and receives the proceeds recovered.

"Pass-Through" agreements are a commonly used tool to allow the General Contractor to assert against the Owner delay, accelerations and disruption claims caused by the Owner that damaged a Subcontractor. These are often found in subcontract and purchase order forms of General Contractors, but they can also be independent agreements that are not in a subcontract or purchase order.

Texas Construction Association General Counsel, Richard Thomas, along with members of his firm, file an *amicus curiae* (friend of the court) brief in support of the position that Texas law should recognize pass-through claims and thus a general contractor can assert a claim on behalf of a subcontractor against an owner. The brief was filed on behalf of the American Subcontractors Association and the Subcontractor Legal Defense Fund provided compensation for the brief. In its decision, the Texas Supreme Court used strikingly similar language and reasoning in their Opinion as was contained in the brief.

Additionally, the State Supreme Court cited the Texas Prompt Pay Act as support for upholding the use of these contracts. Subcontractors in Texas worked to pass the Prompt Pay Act in 1993.

Texas becomes the 20th state to recognize the validity of these contacts. Only one State, Connecticut, has refused to recognize the validity. For Federal Claims, the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled in favor of "Pass-Through" agreements.

Safety Glazing, a standard, finally, maybe

Yet another exciting chapter in the ANSI Z97.1 chronicles

Members of the ANSI Z97.1 Accredited Standards Committee have been working for many years on a safety-glazing standard to replace the 1984 ANSI Z97.1 standard, and their efforts near the finish line.

The standard was reaffirmed in 1994 without changes; since then, more than 40 producers, users and general-interest participants have served on the committee and contributed to the development of a new standard. In 2001, the ASC balloted and approved a draft of the standard. However, it was not finished because an appeal was filed resulting in a November 2002 ballot on specific challenged sections of the revised standard.

The American National Standards Institute ballot process requires approval by at least a majority of the ASC members and at least two-thirds of those voting, excluding abstentions. The committee must make an effort to resolve all expressed objections and inform those submitting negatives of their right to appeal. Subsequent substantive changes, such as deletion or revision of requirements to resolve objections, together with unresolved objections, are reported to the ASC to give all members an opportunity to respond or to reaffirm or to change their votes. Here is how the process unfolded.

Public Review - April 2002

All ANSI standards must go through public review. The public-review process, implemented by ANSI, is an opportunity for any interested party to submit comments or concerns regarding the standard. These concerns must be dealt with in the same manner as at the ASC level, as ballot comments.

In April 2002, the standard was submitted to ANSI for public review. The standard appeared in the July 7 issue of Standards Action with a response deadline of July 22, 2002. Several comments were received and had to be resolved by the ASC.

In spring 2002, O'Keefe's, Inc., a San Francisco manufacturer of specialty glass, filed an appeal with the ASC. O'Keefe's first appeal issue dealt with the appointment and membership of the Glazing Industry Secretariat Committee and secretariat for the Accredited Standards Committee. The second issue related to action on one of O'Keefe's negative ballots, and the third pertained to its request for a re-ballot on the issue of a Class C impact-test procedure for wired glass.

On October 4, 2002, an ANSI appeals panel unanimously granted a re-ballot on the Class C impact test procedure for wired glass. This action resolved two of the issues. On the subject of GISC's role as secretariat, the panel noted that three of the GISC board members had wired glass interests, including the appointed liaison to the Z97 committee. Thom Zaramba, a lawyer with Roetzel & Andres in Toledo, OH, who represents United Kingdom manufacturer Pilkington plc. Thus, the panel recommended that GISC designate a more neutral liaison to the Z97 committee and

also suggested that, in the future, the Z97 committee considered utilizing legal counsel without current or recent client interest in the actions of the Z97 committees.

On September 13, 2002, I assumed the position of ASC chairman, taking over from John Kent, president of Administrative Management Systems, Inc. in Henderson Harbor, NY. I was then technical director of the Primary Glass Manufacturers Council. Following the GANA Fall Meeting, I received five letters requesting a ballot to remove language that dealt with a center punch fragmentation test for tempered glass. The writers pointed to a need for additional research in the development of the test, with emphasis on particle count. I agreed to ballot the deletion of the center-punch test along with the Class C re-ballot.

On November 6, 2002 the Z97 Steering Committee met by conference call to discuss the appeals decision. It directed the secretary to immediately prepare the Class C re-ballot on the impact-test procedure for wired glass. It also addressed the public comments received on the first public review of the standard. It was decided to resolve the public comments in person at a previously scheduled March 2003 meeting. Finally, I informed the Steering Committee that I planned to ballot the deletion of the center-punch fragmentation test for tempered glass.

The Class C impact-test procedure for wired glass and center-punch fragmentation ballots were distributed to ASC members. The ballots were shown with strike-throughs of both the Class C language and the center-punch language, included in ANSI Z97 as the result of the November 2000 balloting. Approval of the ballots would delete the appropriate language from the draft standard.

The final tally resulted the retention of Class C and deletion of the center-punch test.

In February 2003, Jarred Abel, son of Greg Abel, sued a maker of wired glass and its US distributor and the installer for injuries suffered in 2001 to Abel's hand, elbow and forearm. The injuries occurred at the University of Oregon Fitness and Recreation Center in Eugene, where he hit wired glass in an interior fire-rated door. The suit, filed in the US District Court in Portland, OR, also named the Glazing Industry Secretariat Committee, Glazing Industry Code Committee and Z97.1 Accredited Standards Committee as defendants.

The GISC, GICC, and ASC have filed a joint motion to dismiss the complaint against them; that motion is still pending before the court. Among other claims, Abel contends that GISC, GICC and the ASC were negligent for not removing wired-glass from the Z97 standard as a type of safety-glazing material intended to minimize the likelihood of cutting and piercing injuries to humans if broken by human contact.

Greg Abel, who established the Oregon-based group Advocates for Safe Glass, and ASC committee member Ray V Foss, a public-interest member from Parkersburg WV, made presentations at the ASC March 2003 meeting in support of their public comments submitted during the first public review of the Z97 standard. At the meeting, the Class C and center-punch fragmentation test ballot comments and negatives were reviewed. The ballots were

unresolved at the meeting and were re-circulated to all ASC members so that re-affirm or change their vote in light of the information presented at the meeting.

After the 30-day period, the secretary advised the ASC that the ballot to remove Class C language from the draft ANSI Z97 still had failed, and the ballot to remove the center-punch fragmentation test had passed.

On April 29, 2003, O'Keefe's filed a second appeal. This time the company officials argued that the ASC had failed to ballot acceptances of a Class C impact-test procedure as ordered by the appeals panel and the 2000 ballot failed to establish the required two-thirds vote for inclusion of Class C.

The three panelists from the first appeal served again as the appeals panel and the hearing was held on July 3, 2003. It denied the appeal on all three points. On the first point, the panel noted that the re-ballot on Class C, while not in the form requested by O'Keefe's, was clear in what an affirmative vote and a negative vote would mean. On the other points, the panel noted that the ballot to delete a Class C impact-test procedure and all references to wired glass did not receive the two-thirds affirmative vote to pass on the re-balloting following the first appeals-panel decision. Thus, it concluded, that the Class C and wire-glass language should remain in the standard because it had received the necessary two-thirds affirmative ballots on the November 2000 ballot.

Because the deletion of the center-punch fragmentation language represented a substantive change to the Z97 standard, these sections were submitted for a second public review. As of the end of July, ANSI has not advised the secretary as to when Standards Action will publish the public-review information. However, after publication and the 30-day public review, the committee will meet to review and respond to any comments that have been received. The standard will be turned over to the ANSI Board of Standards Review. If there are appeals, the appeals must be addressed before the standard is approved.

After the standard has been approved by the ANSI Board of Standards Review as an American National Standard, and audit will be scheduled to review the ASC's and committee's records.

Close to the Finish Line

While the road to the finish line has been long and arduous, it does appear the review of the 1984 ANSI Z97.1 standard will result in a new ANSI Z97.1 standard in the coming months. This, of course, depends on whether any other appeals are filed, in which case, the final approval may be delayed.

Apart from the Class C wired-glass issue, many new sections promise to enhance the standards usefulness to the industry, including sections on weathering requirements, requirements for organic coated films and plastics, testing of bent safety glass and test fixture details for bent safety glass.

-Over 80,000 Iraqi soldiers are patrolling the streets side by side with US soldiers.

-Over 400,000 people have telephones for the first time ever.

-Students are taught field sanitation and hand washing techniques to prevent the spread of germs.

-An interim constitution has been signed.

-Girls are allowed to attend school for the first time ever in Iraq.

-Text books that don't mention Saddam are in the schools for the first time in 30 years.

Don't believe for one second that these people do not want us there. I have met many many people from Iraq that want us there and in a bad way. They say they will never see the freedoms we talk about but they hope their children will. We are doing a good job in Iraq and I challenge anyone, anywhere to dispute me on these facts.
